



Health data, including a set of core indicators that includes data about population health status, communicable disease, environmental health risks and related illness, health disparities, and access to critical health services are updated at least every other year and used as the basis for continuous tracking of the health status of the population. Some data sets may have less frequent updates available but should still be included for review as part of an annual health data report. Health data include quantitative data with standard definitions and standardized measures as well as qualitative data.




Displaying Your Documents

1. Documents.
 - Include a title or cover page.
 - Highlight:
 - Title.
 - Date.
 - Text in the document that meets the measure.
 - Use only what you need to meet the standard.
2. Websites.
 - Convert Web sites to .html documents.
 - Attach document.
3. Read-me notation (Best Practice).
 - Why standard applies.
 - Where to look in document.


Barrier analysis (qualitative data) is incorporated into most chapters off *The Health of Washington State*. An additional example of using qualitative data in assessment is the WIC Listens Project Report. NICE staff (Amira El-Bastawissi) provided epidemiological consultation and served as a project team member for this report.

Displaying Your Documents

1. Each document requires it's own subtopic box that includes the measure #, name of the document and the date.
2. Attach each document separately. Do not combine them all into one document.
3. The number of documents required will depend on the requirements of the standard.




