Everett paramedic surrenders license for sexual misconduct

OLYMPIA -- David Vier, a Snohomish County paramedic recently agreed to surrender his license (PARA.ES.00123325) to the state Emergency Medical Services and Trauma Systems program.

The Department of Health suspended Vier's credential in January 2015 after he was criminally charged for arranging to meet a 15-year-old girl for sex.

The Snohomish County paramedic was convicted of communication with a minor for immoral purposes, a class C felony, in King County Superior Court. Vier may not work as a paramedic in Washington including any temporary, emergency, or volunteer practice.
