

Dental Care Provider Survey Summary Report: Spokane County

Survey year: 2012

The Department of Health (DOH) conducts the Dental Care Provider Survey to obtain health care access data. This data is used in the <u>Health Professional Shortage Area</u> (HPSA) designation analysis. HPSA is a federal program administered by the federal Office of <u>Health Resources and Services Administration</u> (HRSA). A HPSA designation identifies areas with provider shortages for underserved and uninsured populations. To learn more about the program please see the <u>HPSA Overview</u>.

This summary report reflects dental survey responses. The department makes every attempt to establish a close to accurate number of dentists by collecting lists from local health departments, the National Provider Identifier Registry and other sources. To meet federal guidelines in the analysis the target response rate is >75%. This report offers an aggregate summary of the survey responses.
