The state's proposed rules on HIV notification are a delicate balance between individual privacy rights and protection of the general public. Under existing public health policies, physicians talk to HIV-positive patients and urge them to notify their sexual partners that they have been exposed to the deadly virus. If the states were graded on a curve for chickenpox vaccination rates, Washington would get an F. It ranks last among all states, with a 66.6 percent vaccination rate among 19- to 35-month-old children. In Spokane, the rate is even lower, with only a quarter of kids getting the vaccine in 2000. Experts say the reasons are numerous, ranging from slow acceptance of the vaccine among parents and doctors, to schools' not requiring that students get a shot.

That could mean 9 million fewer uninsured, reducing the total to 36 million instead of the 45 million reported for 2003, the latest year for which data are available.

After a tip was made to the district, an investigator visited Bartelheimer Brothers Dairy on 92nd Street SE three times over the last week, finding at least two mostly decomposed cows in a wetlands area and an unknown number of cows partially buried under piles of straw.

 A new infectious disease comes along every year but in looking out for the next big global virus we risk overlooking less dramatic illnesses that cause millions of quiet deaths, a top UN health official said. "The problem with infectious agents is that whilst we are getting new ones, the old ones don't go away," the World Health Organization's Anarfi Asamoah-Baah told Reuters AlterNet.
- Flu Vaccine Supply May Be Tight, but Not Sever, Officials Say**

 The Chiron Corporation said yesterday that it anticipates making only about half as many doses

of flu vaccine this year as it had intended to provide last year, before its factory was shut down because of bacterial contamination. Still, authorities said, the expected production from Chiron should be enough to stave off a severe shortage of the vaccine this winter, though it is possible supply could still be somewhat tight.

Rule Development

Proposed Rule Making (CR-102)

- **Chapters 246-272A WAC Onsite sewage systems**

CR-102 Filed: April 7, 2005

This chapter contains the design, installation, and operation requirements for onsite sewage systems handling 3500 gallons per day and under; specific criteria for proprietary product registration; and direction to local health jurisdictions to develop an onsite sewage system management plan.

Rule Making Order (CR-103)

- **WAC 246-100-166 Immunization of child care and school children against certain vaccine-preventable diseases**

The rule has been reviewed and redrafted to improve its clarity, note changes in reporting, and update Advisory Committee on Immunization Practice (ACIP) recommendations on childhood and adolescent immunization. In 2003, the State Board of Health determined that current language could be made more clear. Since the rule's original adoption in 1997, new technology makes it possible to consider a single reporting date and electronic filing for schools, preschools, and child care centers. In addition, the ACIP has revised the Childhood & Adolescent Immunization Schedule yearly.
