

**Amendments to Proposed Rule Text, Chapter 246-366A WAC, Filed as WSR 08-15-174,
Approved by State Board of Health October 8, 2008**

Section or Subsection Number	Text
Add new subsection 005(5) and renumber remaining subsections	These rules are not intended to replace requirements of the building code council under title 51 WAC, but may be more stringent to protect health and safety.
Revised 010(14)	“Faucet” means the type of plumbing fixture that is a valved outlet device attached to a pipe that normally serves a sink or tub and can discharge both-hot water, and-cold water, or both.
Revise 010(20)	“Laboratory” means instructional areas of the school facility where students might be exposed to greater potential health and safety hazards than typically exist in general academic classrooms. <u>Such laboratories may include, but are not limited to, science laboratories (for example: Chemistry, physics, material science, and biology) laboratories and art laboratories studios (for example: Print-making, photography, and darkrooms, ceramics studios, and print making studios).</u>
Revise 010(31)	“School facility” means school-owned or leased buildings or grounds intended-owned or leased by the school or donated to the school for the primary purpose of student use including, but not limited to, portables, playgrounds, and sports fields.
Revise 020(2)(a)(iii)	Consult with school officials upon completion of the inspection about findings and recommended follow-up actions <u>and, if necessary, develop a correction schedule.</u> Approaches and timelines used to address noncompliant conditions will depend on the level of risk to health and safety presented by the condition, and may include a correction schedule developed in consultation with school officials <u>consideration of low-cost alternatives.</u>
Revised 030(6)	If school officials notified the local health officer <u>in writing</u> prior to September 1, 2010, that construction is planned for a particular site, the site review requirements in effect at the time of notification apply, provided that school officials comply with all agreed on timelines for completion.
Revise 040(1)(c)	Additions to or alterations of an existing school facility consisting of more than five thousand square feet of floor area or having a value of more than ten percent of the total replacement value of <u>an existing</u> the school facility;

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Revise 050(1)(a)	Obtain a preoccupancy inspection by the local health officer of construction projects subject to WAC 246-366A-040(1), <u>conducted in coordination with a final inspection by the local building official, in order to ensure imminent health hazards are corrected</u> before allowing school facilities to be occupied;
Delete subsection 060(8) and renumber remaining subsection	Prohibit the use of chromated copper arsenate or creosote treated wood where it is accessible to students.
Revise 095(2)(a)	For school facilities constructed <u>or sited</u> under a building permit for which the local permitting jurisdiction received a completed building permit application on or after September 1, 2010, provide, <u>as a minimum, outdoor air according to WAC 51-52-0403, Table 404.3, Required Outdoor Ventilation Air.</u>
Revise 095(2)(b)	For school facilities constructed <u>or sited</u> under a building permit for which the local permitting jurisdiction received a completed building permit application before September 1, 2010, <u>conduct standard operation and maintenance best practices including, but not limited to, making timely repairs, removing obstructions, and replacing filters and fan drive belts, and setting system controls so that, to the extent possible given the design of the ventilation system, outdoor air is provided consistent with WAC 51-52-0403, Table 404.3, Required Outdoor Ventilation Air.</u>
Delete subsection 095(4)	Restrict the use of laminators to locations with mechanical exhaust ventilation or source capture systems.
Revise subsection 095(5), renumber it as 095(4), and renumber remaining subsection	Limit student exposure to air contaminants of public health importance produced by <u>heat laminators, laser printers, photocopiers, and other office equipment by locating, operating, and maintaining equipment as recommended by the manufacturer placing such equipment in appropriately ventilated spaces and providing instruction to users on how to operate and maintain equipment as recommended by the manufacturer.</u>
Revise 125(1)(b)	Single-service handwashing soap at <u>near</u> each handwashing sink;
190(1)(b)	Promptly <u>Correcting conditions not in compliance with these rules within an appropriate timeframe given the level of risk to health and safety;</u>
